CRANLEIGH HERITAGE TRAIL

Stroll through the centre of Cranleigh

and discover evidence of royal processions, Civil War politics, and revolutionary healthcare. Notice homes, shops, even a petrol station, that have stood for hundreds of years, witnessing change and transformation, and connecting our modern village to the stories of its past.

Small beginnings...

Rising from the fertile soil of a prehistoric lake, the farming settlement at Cranleigh was too small to be included in the Domesday Book (a survey of landholding in 1086). The Guildford-Horsham railway, which ran for 100 years from 1865, saw a rapid increase in residents. Cranleigh today embraces its self-proclaimed status of the largest village in England.

Growth and change...

Called Cranley after the cranes (wading birds) that flocked here, the railway led to an increase in mail and confusion with nearby Crawley. After an appeal by the Post Office, the village changed its name in 1867. Look out for the original spelling and examples of the long-necked crane.

Stay-a-while...

Complete your walk by enjoying Cranleigh today at one of its independent pubs or cafes. Then explore the playgrounds and meadows of Knowle Country Park or join the Downs Link Trail along the former railway line.



Follow this self-guided trail between 15 heritage points in the centre of Cranleigh.

Each heritage point is numbered and illustrated on the map.

Find the QR code at each location and point a mobile phone camera (or downloaded QR reader) at the code. Click on the link for more about the building or monument.

The walk begins at the Village Hospital Cottage (1), at the eastern end of the High Street, and ends in Stocklund Square (15), the site of the old railway station.


